We all know how easy it is to fill two spare hours with things you don't really want to do. Rush-hour commuting, cleaning out your wardrobe, preparing your taxes—the world is full of mundane activities waiting to ambush 120 minutes of your precious time. And when you're far from home, on a business trip packed with long days of meetings and long evenings of reports, the last thing you want to do is squander your only two free hours looking for a decent place to eat or shop. So here's the answer: VIVE's two-hour guide to getting the most out of any city you're in, no matter how briefly.

TWO HOURS IN Kuala Lumpur

One of Asia's best-kept secrets, Kuala Lumpur is more than just a stopover en route to Europe. Cleaner than Bangkok, more charismatic than Singapore and less manic than Hong Kong, the city affectionately dubbed 'KL' is an exotic mix of east and west. Its religious and business structures will keep your neck craned skyward, the shopping will keep your overdraft high and the warmth of the Malaysian people will have you booking your next visit before you leave. But don't tell anyone: once the word is out, Kuala Lumpur may just lose its magic.

TRAVEL TIPS

The Golden Triangle is the nickname for Kuala Lumpur's financial zone—and where there's finance, there's shopping. You'll find most international hotels, banks and shops in this area, which is actually a square bordered by the thoroughfares of Jalan Sultan Ismail, Jalan Bukit Bintang and Jalan Ampang.

Be warned: the city's inner districts have no names and most buildings have no street numbers. If you can see the Twin Towers, then the safe bet is that you're still in the city.

If you're planning to chew gum, don't: like Singapore, signs consistently outline fines for spitting gum on the streets. It seems to work—the city streets are very clean.

Public transport in Kuala Lumpur is modern, with both a rail system and a monorail. Taxis are metered, reasonable in price and air-conditioned to make those late nights home a breeze.



SEE

PETRONAS TWIN TOWERS

The city skyline is dominated by the Petronas Twin Towers. With no water views to haggle over, views of the Twin Towers push up real estate prices. These impressive glass-and-steel twins cost over US\$1 billion (AU\$1.3 billion) to build and stand 451m high over 88 stories. They were the world's tallest buildings until 2003, when they were topped by Taiwan's 508m Financial Centre. Islamic design influences the foyer's intricate tiling and latticework. Make sure

you visit the linking bridge on the 41st floor. Tickets are free, but queue between 8.30am and 11am to secure entry for views across the city and beyond.



THEAN HOU CHINESE TEMPLE

65 Persiaran Endah (off Jalan Syed Putra) Malaysia is a mix of Malay, Chinese and Indian cultures, with Islam, Buddhism and Hinduism all co-existing. This makes for some excellent temples, and the Thean Hou is the most impressive of the Chinese ones. Walk barefoot to the main hall on a stone pathway and into the temple itself, a masterpiece of reds, golds and pinks. Light a prayer candle and spin the wheel to read your fortune. Legend has it that washing your hands in the holy water will boost fertility.

LAKE GARDENS

Jalan Perdana

City flyers can take time out in these 92 hectares of groomed gardens, which hold butterflies, orchid displays, lakes and a mammoth jogging track (a good way to keep your jetlagged body in shape). Created in the late 1800s by British colonialists, Lake Gardens still holds many of the original botanical treasures. Walk to the northern end to see the Parliament buildings.

It is considered sacrilege to leave Kuala Lumpur without shopping. The Suria KLCC shopping complex is at the base of the Twin Towers—a good place to kill some time while waiting for your skyline viewing.



But don't let Chanel, Ferragamo and Gucci scare you into thinking it's all high-end shopping. You'll find local designers and even franchises such as Marks & Spencer alongside the haute couture. Stick your head out at the food court for a view of KLCC's 20 acres of parks and gardens.

MID VALLEY MEGAMALL

'Mega' says it all, though for the committed shopper 'Mecca' may be a better description. This mall is the size of a small city, with 18 cinemas, a bowling alley and over 400 shops. It's not as upmarket as KLCC, which means more shopping bags to haul home.

Put your walking shoes on—Times Square is the largest shopping mall in the country, with more than 1,000 outlets. Better still, buy some shoes there from one of the hundreds of shoe stores. There's a theme park, Imax cinema and even a branch of London's Debenham's. You may never want to leave.

JALAN PETALING NIGHT MARKETS

Petaling Street, nightly

Kuala Lumpur's pasar malam, or 'night markets', are an extreme contrast to the air-conditioned malls. Markets can be found around the city each week but Jalan Petaling is open every night in Chinatown, for haggling over DVDs, music, clothes and handicrafts. Pick up a fake Louis Vuitton bag,

dine on claypot chicken and inhale the energy of this old-time shopping heartland.



Try the Saigon-style pomelo and prawn salad with the peppered garlic beef. Then head downstairs to Bar Savanh with its decor of four-poster beds, Buddha heads and carp ponds for cocktails and a turn on the dance floor.

Enjoy a soak in the private whirlpool afterwards.
