Whistler/Blackcomb

WHISTLER/BLACKCOMB has a reputation. It's the last to leave the party with a ski season that lasts well into June, long after the others have gone home. It's big, and in an industry where size matters, it wins with over 8000 skiable acres and the largest above-tree line terrain and bowls in North America.

Think mammoth mountains capped with snow and lined with fir trees. Think live music festivals by candlelight, pool halls with home brew, martini bars, terrain parks, freestyle skiers and maple syrup. To Canadians, winter in Whistler is the 'off season'. To Australian boarders and skiers, it's Mecca.

Two mountains, Whistler and Blackcomb, make up this infamous ski resort. A pedestrian bridge and a plethora of ski lifts and gondolas link Whistler village and Blackcomb village, meaning double the snow and double the après action.

Canadian casual is *de rigueur*, though sometimes you may have to prod the locals to make sure they're awake. Real fur is a faux pas and denim is considered formal in the village square lined with open-air bistros for people spotting after the lifts close, but don't be deceived, there are big bucks in these hills (or at least on the menu). The Bear Foot Bistro is a Whistler icon, with a wine list boasting the world's best and a first-rate chef in Melissa

Craig, who spent time with both Tetsuya and Neil Perry.

Tempting? It would seem too tempting for some. The restaurant was victim of a well-publicised wine heist last year. The thieves obviously knew their wine and the cellar intimately, cutting security wires and making out with a handful of carefully selected bottles that came to the sum value of \$200,000. Ouch.

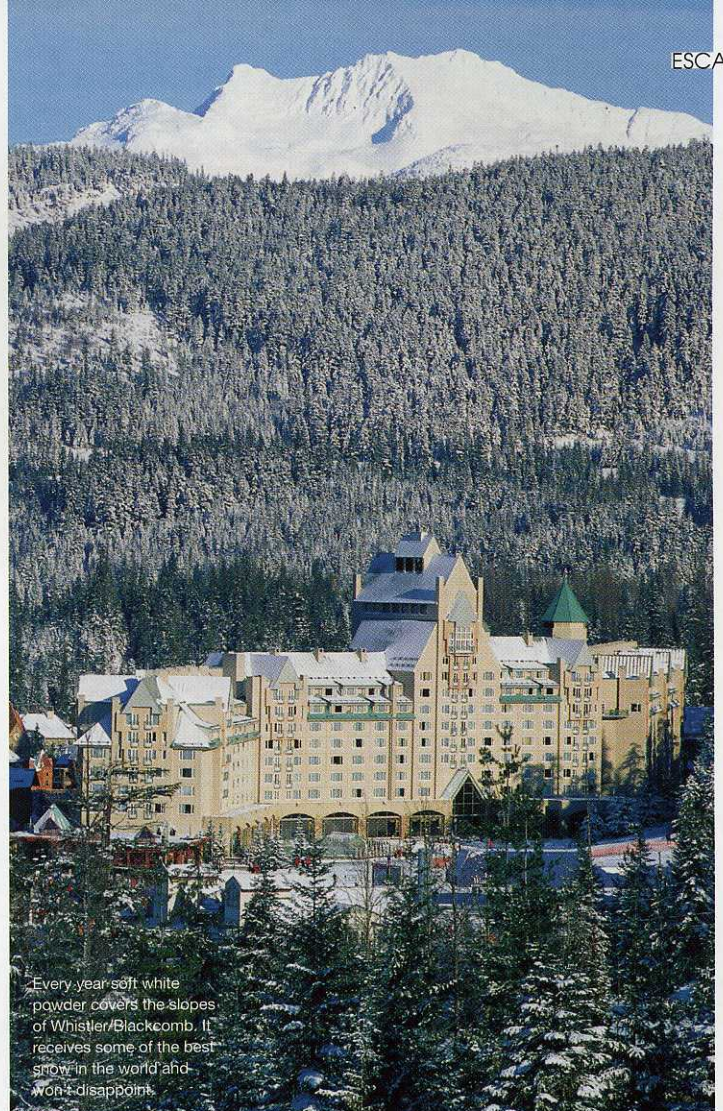
