AFRICA

If the thought of camping out in the African savannah with children in tow seems too stressful, a string of private houses across Zambia allows families to explore the country's stunning scenery and teeming wildlife without having to go near a tent-peg. AUSTRALIA

Slick new eco-resort The Byron at Byron has combined a perfect setting in the virgin rainforests of Australia's east coast (yet only 20 minutes from Ballina airport) with amazing food and an array of spa treatments. The 92 bedrooms are linked to the yoga centre, restaurant, spa and pool via elegant decked walkways, so there's an ever-present sense of the exotic. ASIA

The celebrated Sri Lankan architect Geoffrey Bawa built some of the island's greatest hotels — from

tropical hideaways to converted colonial beachside bungalows. His first building was his own home, Lunuganga.

CARIBBEAN

If you've always dreamed of enjoying the sophistication of St Barts but been put off by the prices, head for Kù (above), the new all-suite resort in Anguilla. From £75 per night, you'll get a minimalist suite with ocean views, sitting room, dining room and kitchen. The resort has a small spa,

SOUTH AMERICA

The estancia-style El Colibri, in the heart of Argentina, has eight lavishly-furnished rooms, its own stable of 45 polo ponies and 12 criollo horses on which to canter around 170 hectares of farmland. There are no pesky hosts looking to chat, since the owners, Nici and Tom Stanford, feel that luxury at Tonic is all
